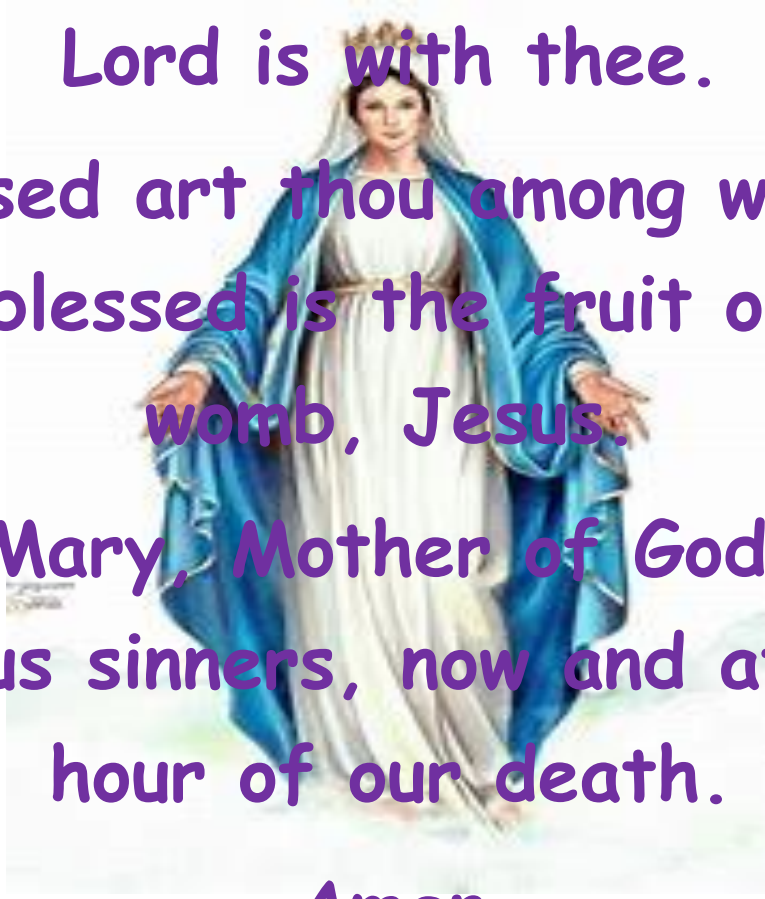
## The Hail Mary

***"Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with thee." (Luke 1:28)***

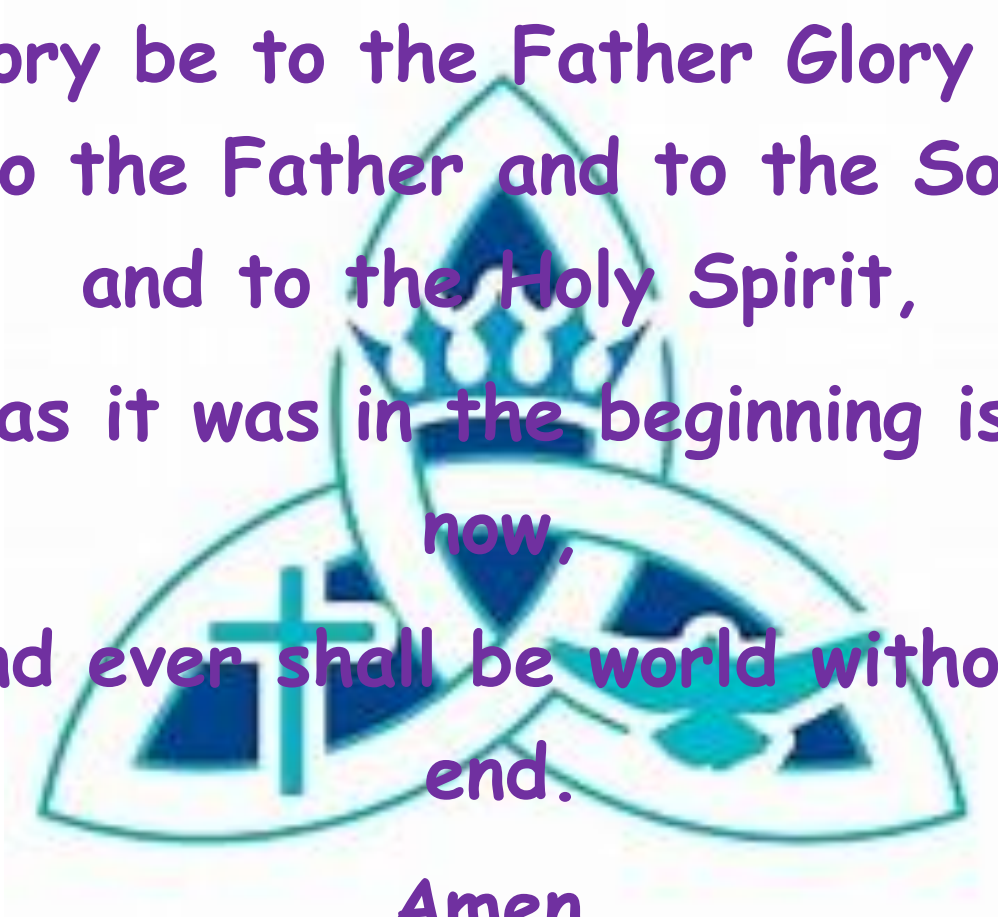
*The next portion comes from Elizabeth's exclamation when Mary visits her:*

*The Apostles' Creed is an early statement of Christian belief that dates back to the 2nd century. It was not written directly by the Twelve Apostles, but it is called the Apostles' Creed because it summarizes the core teachings of the apostles.*

## Angel of God

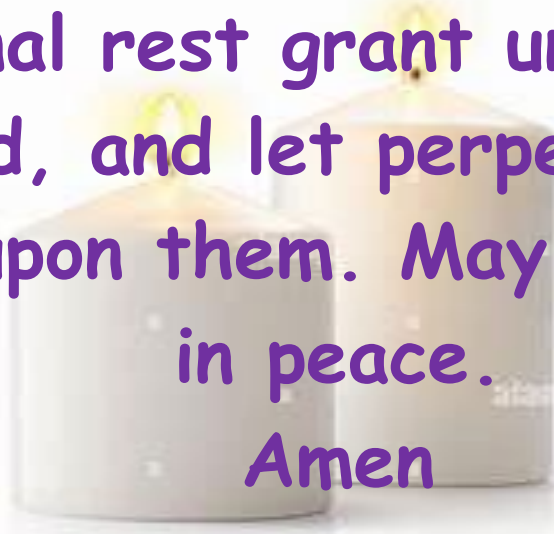
Angel of God Angel of God,

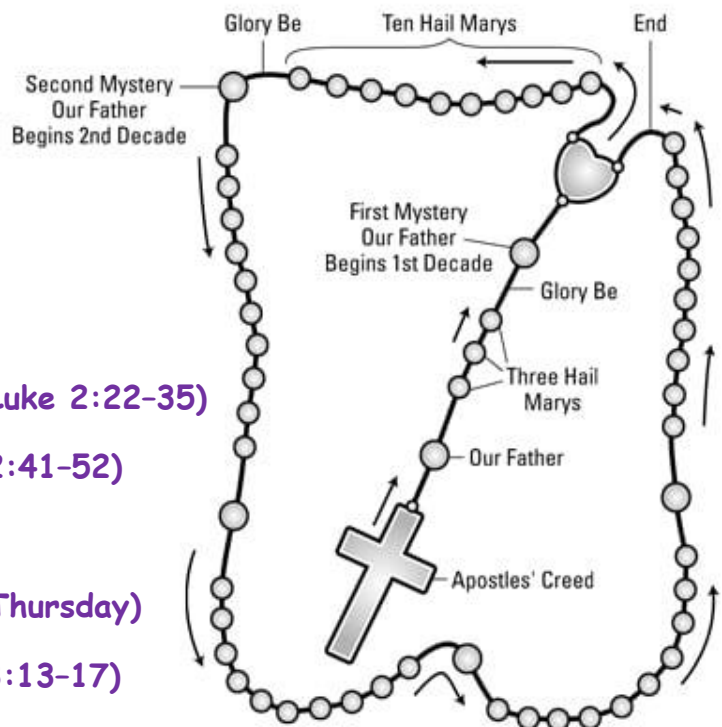
The Agony in the Garden (Mark 14:32-42)

## The Magnificat (Canticle of Mary)

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord,

God who is mighty has done great things for me,  
holy is His name;

His mercy is from age to age on those who fear  
Him.

He has shown might with His arm;

He has confused the proud in their inmost

He has deposed the mighty from their thrones and  
raised the lowly to high places.

The hungry He has given every good thing,  
while the rich He has sent empty away.

He has upheld Israel his servant,  
ever mindful of His mercy;

Even as He promised our fathers,

## The Confiteor ( I Confess)

I confess to almighty God  
and to you, my brothers and sisters,  
that I have greatly sinned  
in my thoughts and in my words,  
in what I have done,  
and in what I have failed to do;  
through my fault, through my fault,  
through my most grievous fault;  
therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin,  
all the Angels and Saints,  
and you, my brothers and sisters,  
to pray for me to the Lord our God.  
Amen

*In the **Catholic Church**, the Confiteor is an important prayer of **repentance** and **humility**, traditionally recited during the **Penitential Act** at the beginning of **Mass**.*
